## A Message from the Priest In Charge

Dear Friends,

This is the last time I will be writing to you as your Priest in Charge. My last Sunday with you (April 28) will be here in much too short a time. After that date, I will have to stay away from All Saints and Ascension, not even able to serve as Supply Priest. Even though this will be painful for me, it's a good idea, and a true gift to your new priest. The worst situation for any new priest is to have the former priest hanging around and (probably) interfering in the administration of the parish. So, you won't see me around for a good while.

You can't know what a wonderful growth experience it has been for me (and for Leslie) to serve as your priest. I still remember getting a call from **Midge Winston** in 2003, asking me to serve as long-term Supply Priest at All Saints. She mentioned, "We're a historically black parish, if that makes any difference." I was tempted to respond, "Yes, and I'm a historically white priest, if that

makes any difference." Midge and I have chuckled about that many times since.

Getting to know you, hearing your stories of "living while Black," has opened my eyes and my mind to the racism that infects so many white folks, even when they're not aware of it. White privilege (and male privilege) is something that is very real, and only having one's consciousness raised (as you all have done for me) can awaken one to its pernicious effects on people of color.

So thanks for sharing so much of your lives over the past sixteen years, thanks for so much wonderful soul food, and thanks for allowing me to serve you as your priest.

I'll miss you, but you'll forever be in my thoughts and prayers.

## Helping the Homebound Stay Connected

Our parish has Lay Eucharistic Ministers who are licensed to dispense communion to the sick, homebound, and to those simply unable to attend church. One such visiting minister is **Stanley Johnson** who volunteers and serves about six homebound parishioners every month. Administering the holy sacraments only takes about 5 minutes. But his total visiting time usually last about 30 minutes or more. Stanley says that the extra time to socialize is just as important as communion.

This is because most people cherish having interaction with those from the outside.

Stanley has been a licensed visiting Lay Eucharistic Minister for over 25 years. He knows first hand how it feels to be "forgotten" by the church while caring for his mother and first wife when they were terminally ill. But eventually they received Eucharistic visits from **Rose Marie Bell** and **Edna Elam** (former parishioners). Shortly after both loved ones passed, Johnson was inspired and answered the call to this important ministry of serving homebound parishioners. He vowed to help others from becoming forgotten and disconnected.

One of the six regular visits Stanley makes is to **Cleopatra Anderson**. Mama Cleo views his visits as an extension of the many forms of caregiving she receives at *Delmar Gardens North*. One of her favorite sayings these days is, "I thank God for giving my caregivers the training and knowledge they need to be able to take care of me". This includes Stanley's caring visits.

It is very important that everyone understands that for someone to receive Eucharistic visits that a visitation must be REQUESTED. Many times, the church is simply not aware of a shut-in situation. If you, or a parishioner that you know, would like a lay minister to call on them, please advise the church. Often, one of the ministers will reach out to see if a visitation is desired. But they do not assume that if a member of our church has been reported ill, that the parishioner automatically wants a visitation. Keep in mind that there are some who are private people, and we want to respect their privacy. Just remember that there is no reason for anyone to feel forgotten if a visitation is desired. Simply call the parish office and request it.

## HOLY LISTENING

On March 10, 2019, **Deacon Chester Hines Jr** and **Elizabeth Kroes-Asher**, members of the bishop search and nominating committee, visited All Saints and Ascension to get our feedback on the qualities expected of our next bishop. In preparation for the visit they asked the members of the congregation to think about the following question:

**Jump ahead to ten years from now. What accomplishments do you hope the bishop will have led us to?**

In the meeting, parishioners were divided into several discussion groups. This main question, and several other issues, were distributed among the groups for discussion. Each group summarized and reported their discussion to the overall group for further conversation and recording.

The Diocese has emphasized that the members of the search committee were serious about wanting to hear our voices. They indicated that they were committed to receiving as much input as possible about how people in our congregation and other ministry groups see our diocese going forward. They want to know everyone's vision regarding the work of the Episcopal Church in Missouri, and what we hope for and think we need in a new Bishop.

Holy Listening at All Saints & Ascension Church was originally postponed due to inclement weather. But it was finally rescheduled and coincided with our Black History Celebration potluck dinner which also had to be rescheduled due to weather. It was a very busy Sunday, but thanks to all who endured and offered feedback to the Diocese.



### Motivations by Mildred


