Our New Priest In Charge Has Arrived !



Sunday, May 26, 2019 finally arrived. The **Rev. Renee L. Fenner** had already answered the call to be the new Priest in Charge at the Episcopal Church of All Saints and Ascension. This was the Sunday that she would celebrate her first Eucharist with her new parish family. Despite being a holiday weekend, attendance was up! The pews were occupied with devoted parishioners, former members, guests from Christ Church Cathedral, visitors from St. Barnabas, family and friends of Rev. Renee, and a few other unfamiliar faces.

It was obvious when she began her sermon that Rev. Fenner was very excited about being our new church leader. Her message was motivational and uplifting, and many of us found ourselves hanging onto her every word. She asked us to think back and recall what moment in our lives we were the most afraid. She said that in times of trouble, we should seek spiritual "peace". It was the right message of hope needed to face the future as we move forward together. Her spirit of excitement and encouragement seemed infectious, and this spirit was exhibited as the congregation exchanged the peace.

During announcements, Senior Warden **Bill Young** presented Rev. Renee with a welcoming gift before moving to the parish hall for the ECW Coffee Hour. The reception gave everyone an opportunity to mingle and get to know some of our visitors and guests. More importantly, it allowed us to get to know Rev. Fenner better. Hopefully, we can harness the enthusiasm of this day as our church continues its historic journey.

Getting To Know You

Charles Hughes is very humble and counts his many blessings daily. He was born during the Great Depression in October 1937 in

for 2 years in the Army and was discharged in 1962. He returned to St. Louis and married Stella Fleming. For 2 years, he served in the Army Reserves as a Medic Tech and was discharged as SP4. Next, Charles worked as a copper wire enameler at General Cable for 8 years until they closed in 1974. In 1975, he began working several positions at Monsanto before becoming a Lab Assistant. Before he retired in 1994, he received several awards for improving job safety.

In 1964, Charles and **Stella Hughes** joined Historic All Saints. Charles joined the Men's Club where he and the late Milton Patton became friends. He became a member of the "Biscuit Burners" cooking crew and assisted with the picnic. He eventually became president where he started the "Man of the Year" award, and accomplished many improvement projects. Charles reactivated the Men's Club after the merger with Ascension, but had to step down last year due to failing health.

Mr. Hughes enjoys gardening, fishing, and cooking. He and Stella have one son, Craig, four grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren. Charles believes no human is perfect. He feels that the way we handle our imperfections is as important as acknowledging they exist. He has no patience with dishonesty. Yet his motto is "treat others as you want to be treated". "Mama" would be proud!

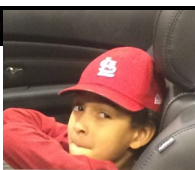

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

It is a joy to write my first article as your new Priest in Charge! Thank you so much for your warm welcome and words of encouragement!

In the Gospel for the 7th Sunday of Easter Jesus prayed, *"I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, that they all may be one."*

I remember saying in my sermon that Jesus recognized that there are boundaries and differences that can and will divide humanity. Still, he prayed that humankind would come to know and to live the same kind of relationship that he shared with his Father—a relationship built on the total giving of themselves to one another and in love. The sermon continued with Leslie addressing the congregation. She reiterated that, in the beginning, she and Michael had no way of knowing that they were about to "embark on a journey that was life-changing". She expressed how much they are going to miss our friendship, our stories, soul food, teaching Sunday school, children performances, and the Gospel Jubilee. But the blessing from all this is that she discovered that we are all alike, more so than we are different.

After Leslie's address, Father fought back the tears as he tried to wrap up the sermon by expressing his personal

thanks for everything the past 16 years have meant. He ended by encouraging us to grow and be strong.

Following the sermon, Bill Young, our Senior Warden, took the podium for a special presentation. In recognition of Leslie's hard work, she was presented with a bouquet of red roses. Afterwards, Bill read and presented a proclamation to Father Dunnington from the city of Northwoods. Then a monetary gift was presented to him. But to top that, a portrait of the All Saints building interfused with the Ascension building was also presented to him. The portrait was specially commissioned from a talented artist in San Francisco.

During service, the choir sang "Order My Steps" which is one of Dunnington's favorites. Following the Eucharist and presentation, everyone gathered outside for a group photo. The event ended with a gourmet dinner prepared for over 100 guests with waited tables.

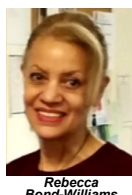


What is ECW Anyway?

The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) organization was first established in 1872. It was originally called "The Woman's Auxiliary", but the name was changed in 1958. Today, ECW includes Episcopal church women who hold a variety of views. They come from all ages, ethnic origins, and socio-economic backgrounds. However, their common thread is the love of God and the wish and desire to do His work.

The national ECW board states that as the eyes, ears, hands, and heart of Christ in the world, their vision is to persist in the work of healing, justice, and peace. They strive to promote educational, spiritual, leadership, stewardship, and social programs. They do this by providing opportunities and tools to grow relationships with God and others through spirituality, prayer, and worship.

The national ECW organization is divided into nine provinces. The Diocese of Missouri is one of 14 Episcopal dioceses that comprise Province V. Our Diocese ECW board is made up of 12 members of which we are proud to claim that our very own **Rebecca (Rica) Bond-Williams** serves as

secretary. This board supports church-level ECW chapters and guilds, and their ministries. Churches may publicize their activities on ECW's Facebook page. Their outreach supports other local ministries in a volunteer capacity. They promote United Thank Offering (UTO) by working with parishes to encourage, support, and to teach an attitude of gratitude. ECW sponsors an annual retreat, allowing women to come together to share spiritual teachings. And every year, they award a young lady in the Diocese with a college scholarship.

The All Saints and Ascension ECW chapter has been very productive lately, and is probably our most active parish organization. It is led by **Ckaria Banks**, president. To support the ECW mission, our chapter is actively involved with many events, fundraisers, and community outreach such as: Quiet Day, Chicken Dinner Sales, Father's Day Brunch, Juvenile Detention Support, Back-To Sunday, Gospel Jubilee, Episcopal City Mission, Trunk-or-Treat, UTO In-Gathering, and Breakfast With Santa. It takes a lot of hard work and coordination to pull off these events successfully. All women of the parish are considered members of ECW, and we appreciate all that they do!

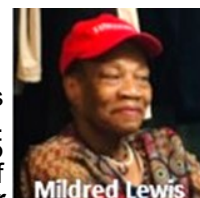
